Stay Safe During an Earthquake

If an earthquake happens, protect yourself right away:

- If you are in a car, pull over and stop. Set your parking brake.
- If you are in bed, turn face down and cover your head and neck with a pillow.
- If you are outdoors, stay outdoors and away from buildings.
- If you are inside, stay and do not run outside and avoid doorways.

1. Drop

Wherever you are, drop down to your hands and knees and hold onto something sturdy. If you are using a wheelchair or walker with a seat, make sure your wheels are locked and remain seated until the shaking stops.

2. Cover

Cover your head and neck with your arms. If a sturdy table or desk is nearby, crawl underneath it for shelter. If no shelter is nearby, crawl next to an interior wall (away from windows). Crawl only if you can reach better cover without going through an area with more

debris. Stay on your knees or bent over to protect vital organs.

3. Hold On

If you are under a table or desk, hold on with one hand and be ready to move with it, if it moves. If seated and unable to drop to the floor, bend forward, cover your head with your arms and hold on to your neck with both hands.

Stay Safe After

- Once the shake has stopped, go outside and quickly move away from buildings and powerlines to an open area.
- If you are in an area that may experi-

ence tsunamis, go inland or to higher ground immediately after the shaking stops.

Boiler 5 Back in Operation



Boiler #5

Boiler #5 which was recently commissioned into service has already been tested at 70% of capacity and performing well.

Powerhouse Superintendent *Leighton Campbell* says based on the testing that has been done the organization is satisfied with the performance of the unit. He indicated, however, that the

team is still conducting improvements on the Pressure Reducing System valve as there are limitations on the routing of the steam.

"On completion of this exercise, the unit will be tested at maximum capacity and we are hoping to have this done by mid-February."

The refurbished boiler is extremely critical to the refinery's efficient operations, and the organization should realize huge cost savings when it is fully operational since it will reduce the use of the less efficient low-pressure packaged boilers. Boilers #5 will also improve steam availability and stability for the operations going forward.

The boiler is currently powered by heavy fuel oil (HFO) only and this will be the case until Boiler #4 is returned to service in April 2024 as a dual-fired (HFO or Gas) unit. Once boiler #4 is commissioned into service, boiler #5 will be taken out of service and will be reconfigured to be dual-fired as well. When this is done, the Plant will be gen-

Largest Oil Vessel Docks at Rocky Point Port

In December, Jamalco's Rocky Point Port achieved a key milestone with the arrival of its largest oil vessel ever at the facility. The oil tanker, Nave Cetus, discharged around 220,300 barrels of oil at the Port. The ship measures roughly 228 meters in length.

The Port's loading arm reaches a maximum height of 41 feet, and its dock has a length of 231.6 meters. Due to limited space to accommodate the huge vessel, Jamalco

sought the assistance of Petrojam to safely dock the ship without causing any damage. A hose of 8 inches in diameter



Critical Calciner Repairs Completed

The Cooler Tube Bundle and the Electrostatic Precipitator (ESP) were recently taken out of service for critical repairs. The two units are essential to the production of quality alumina at the refinery. The repairs became necessary because of the high alumina discharge temperature from the cooler which was caused by restricted tubes in the tube bundles of the heat exchanger. This resulted in a reduced oil flow rate in Unit 1 Calciner.

Production and Maintenance Manager, Recovery, Alicia Marshalleck-Hendricks says the alumina must be cooled before it is transferred from the cooler to the conveyor belt to prevent the belt and skirting from burning and becoming damaged. "The cooler uses four U-tube tube bundles each with 120 tubes. Approximately 38% of the total cooler tubes were restricted with bundle having 60% of its tubes constrained."

The challenges with the Calciner were compounded as the north side wall plates of the third field on the Electrostatic Precipitator (ESP) had severely deteriorated and developed leaks in several areas. "With these challenges, it was difficult for the unit to maintain the required temperature in the ESP and eliminate moisture. This situation impacted the condition of the Calciner stack and created a potential for dust emission. The condition persisted for a long time

with many planned and unplanned hours invested in maintaining the unit's reliability while meeting alumina shipment obligations," Mr. Marshalleck noted.

"A single Calciner can produce approximately 1300 tons of alumina daily and removing a unit from service derails the Refinery's production capacity by 33%. Therefore, the renewal of the cooler tube bundles was critical to the completion of the project and the functioning of the calciner," Mrs. Marshalleck-Hendricks added.

The repair work was completed within 6.46 days and without any safety incidents. The calciner was returned to service ahead of schedule and time with a gain of 31.5 hours.

Mrs. Marshalleck-Hendricks

has heaped commendations on the dedicated Jamalco and contractor teams who worked through the challenges and executed the tasks ahead of the planned timeframe.

will contribute to healthcare for children in Jamaica, we will all be watching and cheering on Cedric Francis as he takes his fitness to the next level.


Jamalcoans Urged to Manage Cervical Health

January is being observed as Cervical Health Awareness Month globally and an online presentation was organized to encourage Jamalcoans to learn more about cervical health and cervical cancer prevention and take steps to help eliminate this preventable cancer.

The presentation was facilitated by Dr. Vincent Williams, Consultant Gynaecologist and Obstetrician at the May Pen Hospital, and he began by reiterating that cervical cancer is totally preventable and no one should be impacted by the disease if they do regular screening at least once

Dr. Williamson explained that cervical cancer is a very common cancer globally with over 400,000 Jamaicans diagnosed and close to 250,000 dying from the disease annually. He also advised that much younger women are presenting with the disease which was not normally the trend.

Cervical Cancer is linked to



the Human Papiloma Virus (HPV) and is normally transmitted through sexual activity. "Education and screening methods are extremely effective in curtailing the disease," Dr. Williamson explained. Screening is normally conducted through a Pap Smear tests. The pap smear test is highly effective at identifying precancerous changes on the cervix and an annual test is recommended for all women over 21 years old, regardless of sexual history.

Dr. Williamson also introduced

the importance of being immunised as a prevention tool and outlined the three types of vaccinations that are offered to women and girls while explaining that "the vaccine gives the body a safe way to build immune system awareness of some HPV strains. This means the body has an easier time clearing out those strains of the virus if a person catches them later." The HPV vaccine does not replace the Pap Smear test, he cautioned.

There are many treatment options available to women who find abnormal or precancerous cells on the cervix, and they are all available in Jamaica. Some symptoms of cervical cancer are vaginal bleeding during and after sex, between periods or after menopause; pelvic pain; or pain and bleeding during sex.

The team was also encouraged to be very consistent and vigilant about their routine healthcare and screen-

Gaining confidence is his abilities, Cedric stopped comparing himself with others and is using his own internal drive as the motivator to keep active. "It is important to me that my body is in perfect health, and running helps me to achieve that as well as forces me to hydrate and watch my diet," he explains.
